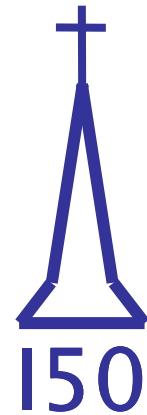
Sunday School

His parish ministry was in the Parish of Northern Pontiac where they lived in Campbell's Bay. Since I was in Shawville, they were my neighbours. John is a gifted and insightful person and we are fortunate to have him. They live in Horton Township, since John has been on Disability for the past three years. He is now doing well and wants to become more involved in church life. I have been providing some personal support for him to help this process. He has been reading and serving at the

Thursday Eucharist and reading at the 8 a.m. Eucharist on Sundays. They now hope to attend the 10 a.m. Liturgy when possible. John will be preaching on June 26th at both services and will be replacing me on two Sundays in August. Please welcome John and Barbara as I am sure you will.

Pastoral Care

As your rector, I am deeply grateful to so many who support me personally and keep me in their prayers. I am aware of the depth of commitment, both personal and financial, that makes our ministry as a community possible. Please remember that I encourage you to call or contact me with any issues or concerns, especially if someone wishes to be visited or desires Holy Communion. This is never an imposition, but I only know about these needs if I am informed. If there is anything or anyone I have missed, or anything I should know, I do not mind hearing about it. I would rather hear often than not at all, so please do not assume that someone has told me. This is how we can work together in sharing ministry. Also, if you would like a home visit or lunch or coffee, please invite me. I would be happy to accept.

Parish Finances

Summer also brings some anxiety to a parish because of the decline in atten-

dance and financial support despite our ongoing expenses. The Wardens and Treasurer will provide details, but I am aware that we are not where we should be and that there is a slight decrease from this time last year. This is cause for concern, especially if we don't "make it up" in the fall. Please keep your givings current and/or consider using the PAR system, which will assure that your contribution is always up-to-date and on time, even if you are away.

Contact During the Summer

During the summer there is no one in the parish office and emails and phone messages are not checked regularly. There is always the option given by our answering service to call me at home and messages left at my home number are returned. My personal email address is also made available, so please feel free to use it at your convenience. If I am absent on vacation, someone else will be available and contact information will be provided to you through the Wardens.

During the service two memorial dedications were made: a cover for the Book of Gospels was dedicated in memory of Jeffrey Roland Draper, and an icon of the Holy Family was dedicated in memory of Cindy Swift. Bishop Chapman also named and dedicated Emmanuel's recently renovated chapel as **The Chapel of the Holy Family**. The icon of the Holy Family is located within the chapel. During the 50 days of the Easter Season which ends on Pentecost, we have had time to reflect on the resurrection of Christ and celebrate a hope that the Holy Spirit is at work among us. Listening to Canon Roger's Sunday messages, it has been a reminder and a time to celebrate newness and renewal of purpose, and our calling as God's people. As God's people, we continue to do work in the community with our commitment to NeighbourLink and The Fountain both financially and through the work of volunteers in its ministry to serve people in need in the Arnprior and surrounding area. Our volunteers continue to provide food as well as direction for their ministry through representation on their board of directors.

The parish breakfast and Hunger Luncheon were both well attended and monies raised will go to PWRDF. For information on what PWRDF is doing in the world, there was an interesting brochure contained in the most recent Anglican Journal outlining its work.

If you remember, we committed to help furnish a room through the "Adopt a Room" project for Cornerstone which is an apartment complex for low-income women in Ottawa. Women will be moving in June and there are wonderful pictures of the facility on the anglicanjournal.com site.

Despite the busyness of Mother's Day, we had a good turnout for Bishop John's visit. During the service a new cover for the Gospel Book and a new icon for the newly named Chapel of the Holy Family were dedicated by the Bishop. A lovely reception followed the service and the efforts of Joan McConnell for organizing the reception and those who helped are much appreciated.

In an effort to communicate and celebrate who we are, we have been busy revamping our website to make it more current and adding information about our many events. If you haven't taken a look you might want to do so at emmanuelanglican.ca. Comments are always welcome. This has been a tremendous piece of work and we thank **Rob Cross and Dan Perfitt** for their persistence in meeting deadlines and collecting content. As well the recently published Visitor's Guide for Arnprior refers to our 150th Anniversary and outlines many of our events.

Thankfully, the rain held off on the day of our Chicken BBQ which enabled our cooks to finish early and the steamy, moist chicken was a big hit with parishioners and visitors alike. Even though there were challenges this year as we competed with so many other events happening, getting

workers and selling tickets, the end result was a positive fun day with proceeds of \$3100. Our thanks go out to the **Wahays, Mossmans, Kingstons** and **Joan McConnell** for assuming lead positions and to all those who helped make the day possible.

The weekend was complete on Sunday with relaxing and listening to the beautiful music of The Cathedral Girls Choir accompanied by Tim Piper on the piano. The applause was astounding as those present showed their appreciation of a well presented concert. Thank you, Roger, for arranging this performance. Money collected through the free will offering helped to provide a honorarium to the Choir with the remaining dollars going towards the crèche project.

Tickets for the 150th Anniversary dinner will be made available in June on a first-come-first-served basis. The tickets are \$25 for a roast beef dinner. Everyone is encouraged to come in period dress for this event.

The Echoes who have been contributing their gifts of music on the third Sunday of the month for many years have decided to take a rest. We would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the Rector and the Parish to thank and acknowledge Phyllis and Mike in their ministry of preparing and leading us in music at Emmanuel. Phyllis will be continuing as a member at large on Parish Council

Work projects continue to be planned. Effective April 1, **Wayne Mossman** has been hired as the new custodian and we thank him for a job well done.

Financial Report: After a year (2010) in which a deficit of \$2,000 was incurred in our operating account, we began 2011 with a balance of \$14,090. The balance at the end of May is \$9,778 demonstrating an operating loss of \$4,312 for the first five months of the year. Simply put, this is a situation which will have to be addressed in the remaining seven months of the year if serious consequences are to be avoided. We remain hopeful that as parishioners become aware of Emmanuel's position they will act accordingly, particularly during the summer months by ensuring that their offerings reach the church office on a regular basis.

Now that June is upon us we are preparing for the closing of Sunday School on June 19 with a church service and parish picnic at the Robert Simpson Park.

As we prepare to take vacations and well deserved rests over July and August, we remind everyone to continue your weekly givings in order to meet the ongoing expenses of Emmanuel. Have a safe and blessed vacation!

\$183,000 PER YEAR...

Often people say "the church needs money", but that isn't accurate. We should really say that "We are the Church and we want to do what God calls us to do and we need money to do it". This has two aspects. First, the "work of the Church" is our work. The Church doesn't exist somewhere else, apart from us. The Church is us. Without mission and ministry we would and should not exist. We do what God calls and enables us to do. Second, we don't give because "the Church needs money" but because this is what Christians must do as part of being disciples. Commitment is everything we are and have. It is both necessary and good for us to give.

This figure of \$183,000 is what we, all of us together at Emmanuel, have decided to spend to do God's work. It includes our property, staff, outreach, administration, and much more. Of this amount, \$164,250 is required from parishioners' regular givings. We hope to raise money from events and activities to make up the difference, but can't depend on that alone.

Our increased giving is the only certain way to make our mission happen and for Emmanuel to thrive. Fundraising events can never bring in enough.

Some will say "cut corners and spend less", but does Jesus tell us to do the least for Him? Does it honour God when we hold back from doing God's work? Nothing we spend is unnecessary and we cannot be a Church that believes God calls us to do less. Would we tell people that we want them to be more committed to less ministry? Of course not.

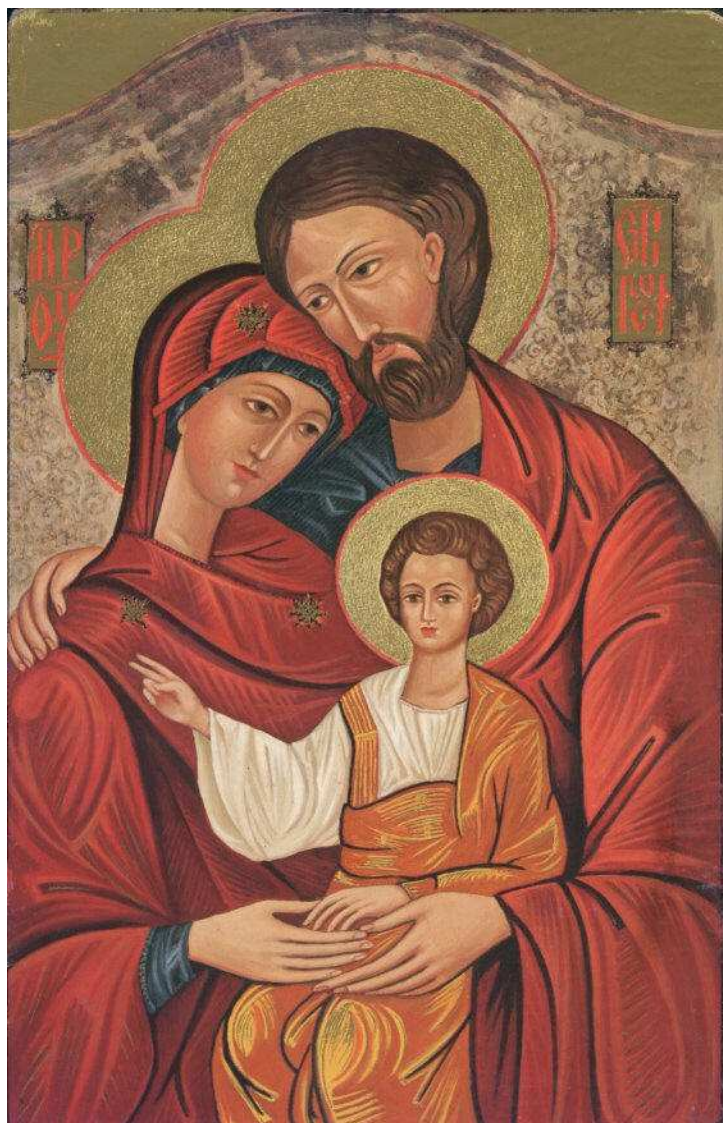
Please remember that we follow Jesus and it is a costly thing to take up His Cross. It was costly to Jesus so, as his Body, it is also costly to us. Nothing worth doing or that we value should be without cost. We do not give to God what is of little worth to us. Instead we give out of the gifts of time and money with which we are blessed so that we honour God who first loved us.

PRAYERS FOR THE DEPARTED

At present, the Prayers for the Departed during our Liturgy include a number of names each Sunday taken from the Burial Register. This is an unusual practice and raises concerns about its rationale. It is normal for the Prayers for the Departed to include those who have died in the past week, either parishioners or friends and relatives of parishioners, whose names are placed by request. If a funeral is conducted by the Parish Clergy, the name of the deceased will always be printed for the following Sunday. If there are other names you wish to have placed in these prayers, please submit them to the Church Office the previous week. It is not required that the names be of parishioners or Anglicans. You may also wish to donate flowers and have the names included in the leaflet. However, the ongoing use of the Burial Register will cease and we will pray for all the Departed, including those you may wish to recall in your own prayers at that time.

THE CHAPEL OF THE HOLY FAMILY



As part of our 150 anniversary celebration, over the past year our former cloakroom has been 'reclaimed' and transformed into a chapel. It began with levelling of the floor (making it even with the church floor) and installation of hardwood, and culminated when Bishop John Chapman named and dedicated our 'new' chapel as the **Chapel of the Holy Family** during our 150th anniversary celebration service on May 8th.

An icon of the Holy Family was also dedicated by Bishop Chapman, and is located in the Chapel. The young Christ, Emmanuel, is surrounded in love by Mary and Joseph. The Holy Family serves as an example and a reminder of the importance of family in both human and divine existence.

This is a very suitable image for Emmanuel Parish, since it reminds us not only that Jesus is Emmanuel, but of the call of God to both Mary and Joseph. It is to Joseph that the name Emmanuel is given to the Child Jesus by the angel (St. Matthew 1.23) as foretold by Isaiah "Behold a virgin shall conceive and bear a son and they shall call his name Emmanuel, which means "God With Us". Mary is given honour in Gospels as mother of our Lord, as she says "All generations shall call me blessed" (St. Luke 1.48). This icon is given by Isabel and Karl Fritsch in loving memory of their daughter Cindy Swift.

The icon presents a stunning visual focal point for quiet reflection. Also within the Chapel is Emmanuel's small altar, a prayer bench, and the memorial book case. Please take time to visit.

EMMANUEL'S 150TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATORY WEEKEND OCTOBER 14TH - 16TH

The highlight will be a visit from the Primate of the Anglican Church of Canada, Archbishop Fred Hiltz.

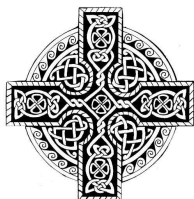
